Dola is 53 years old,. She lives in Andranomena has never been married. She has 5 children aged 25 to 16 (1 boy and 4 girls) and she has 6 grandchildren. They all live with her and she is the only person working.

Mbiny is 50 and she has never been married and she has always lived in Andranomena. Her house is small about 10ft by 10ft and is made of grass and has a dirt floor. She has a table with a suitcase on it where they store their clothes. There is a rush mat on the floor and they sleep on the mat.

Mbiny has 4 children from age 35 to 6, and 8 grandchildren. The cooking and eating area are outside the house and there is a table where Mbiny's daughter sells coffee, tea and fritters to the people who live in Andranomena. Mbiny is grateful to work at the women's center as then she can feed her family. She is the only one who works outside the home. Mbiny has attended the Anglican church since 2008 and she is thankful for all that God has provided for her and her family.

Dola and Mbiny's children do not attend school, so the cycle of poverty continues as they are the only members of the family who work. There is a small market in Andranomena where Dola and Mbiny can buy meat, rice, beans, fruit and vegetables. The larger markets are in Toliara and they would need to take a pousse pousse into town.
